In November 2023 the Ohio chapter of APWA unanimously decided to nominate Joseph Fornaro for this year's Top Ten Public Works Award. The following pages outline several of Joe's accomplishments over his 40 years in public service, his professional qualifications and his commitment to family and community. On behalf of the Ohio Chapter, we are honored to endorse the candidacy of Joseph Fornaro for the Top Ten Public Works Award.

Joseph Formaro's career and commitment to public service began in 1984 at the age of 14 as a volunteer for the Mayfield Heights Service Department. Today, Joe is the Public Works Director for the City of Kirtland, Ohio and an active member in APWA serving on the Ohio State Board as the Membership Chair. Over the past ten years, Joe served as a member of the AWPA Winter Maintenance Sub Committee.

Over his tenure as a Public Works Director, Joe achieved professional certificates from the Board of Certified Safety Professionals (BCSP), Safety Trained Supervisors (STS-C) and the Construction Health and Safety Technicians. In 2015 Joe was certified by the International Society for Arboriculture as an Arborist (ISA Certification). As a certified arborist, Joe achieved National Tree City USA status for both Mayfield Heights and the City of Kirtland. In 2017, Joe completed the Arizona State Public Mangers Certification.

In addition to his professional achievements, Joe was actively involved with the Chesterland Lions Club as a board member for more than 15 years while also coaching youth football and youth wrestling. Today Joe is active with the Kirtland Kiwanis and the Keep American Beautiful Committee as a long-standing member since 2016.

Joe is effective in implementing changes to better the quality of life for all citizens with his professional approach to management, his experience in project planning and development and his commitment to community engagement. It is for these reasons, the Ohio Chapter is nominating Joe Fornaro for the Top Ten Public Works Leader of the Year for 2024.

JOE FORNARO is a dynamic

public works professional who embarked on his career journey at the age of 14 with a passion for public service.



BEST TO START AT THE BEGINNING



In professional achievement, success often unfolds as a testament to resilience, dedication and strategic vision. Joseph Fornaro began his career at the age of 14 with a passion for public service. His experience stands as a testament to the transformative power of dedication, adaptability, and an unwavering commitment to personal and professional growth. He seized pivotal moments and transformed them into stepping stones towards success.

Joe's commitment of lifelong learning positioned him as a leader in his field, and his strategic decisions, coupled with innovative approaches, propelled his career trajectory. Through perseverance, a strong work ethic, and a knack for building meaningful relationships, Joe has become a respected figure in his community and the public works industry.

BLIZZARD OF 1978

It was during the Blizzard of 1978 in Cleveland when Joe Fornaro was introduced to snow and ice control. The blizzard began as two systems merged and the storm rapidly intensified. These two low pressure systems caused an explosive intensification, resulting in a massive and powerful winter storm.

On January 26, 1978, some of the lowest pressure readings in the United States not associated with a hurricane were recorded in Cleveland with wind gusts up to 82 mph and wind chills of -50 to -60

degrees. This was Joe's my first memory of Public Works.

Joe's father, Andrew Fornaro, was one of the most respected, long serving Public Works Directors in Northeast Ohio for the City of Mayfield Heights. His career spanned over 50 years with the same community. Joe recalls his father leaving the house that day saying "I might be gone for a while". Local schools were closed for two weeks as snow drifts were as high as 25 feet in some places.

"The city my dad worked for allowed family members to ride along in certain cases and this was my chance to ride along", says Joe. "That day we helped residents, police and fire trying to get to calls, businesses trying to open, and clearing routes to the major hospital in our city. Snow plowing and salting was provided with manual drive trucks, no 4-wheel drives, and garbage trucks with plows on the front. After the snow was cleared, we climbed into bombardiers to clean all the sidewalks in the city". Joe relates, "This was the moment where I decided this is what I want to do".

The more time Joe spent with his dad over the next 4 years it became clear to him that public works, in his words, "was in my blood". The opportunity to improve the quality of life for people was something Joe felt called to do.

EMPLOYMENT RECORD





CITY OF MAYFIELD HEIGHTS, OHIO

1984-1986 - SEASONAL INTERN

Joe's public service career began when he was 14 and began volunteering with the City of Mayfield Heights in the recreation department, painting fire hydrants, working in the concession stand, and cutting grass. When he turned 16 he joined their seasonal help team

and remained with them until he was 18.

1986-1992 - FULL-TIME ASSOCIATE

At 18 years old he joined the City as a full-time associate (\$3.35/hour) providing solid waste, road repairs, traffic light maintenance, sewer maintenance, and fleet service maintenance for the fire, police, building maintenance, recreation, and public works departments. He also led maintenance for city baseball fields, parks and swimming pools. While he started on the back of a garbage truck pulling trash, his department promoted cross training so he was quickly able to learn all aspects of public works.

1992-2014 - NIGHT FOREMAN & ASSISTANT PUBLIC WORKS DIRECTOR

In 1992 Joe was promoted to the Night Foremen position and held that position until 2008 when he was again promoted and became the Assistant Director of Public Works. This new assignment included budgeting, capitol planning, and fleet maintenance supervision responsibilities. In this role he implemented the city's first ever snow and ice plan, 10-year equipment replacement program, and implemented safety training for the Department.

2014-2020 - PUBLIC WORKS DIRECTOR

In 2014 Joe was hired as Public Works Director for the City of Mayfield Heights.

Member of Heavy Highway Operators Local 860

During a difficult family situation, Joe was a member of Heavy Highway Operators Local 860 working with two area contractors as a second job. Responsibilities included ensuring project safety, reading blueprints, and services on GIS systems. Specific projects included:

- Building of Footers, Building Pads and site work for five new Cleveland Schools
- Site work and sewer and waterline layout and installation for two new schools in Madison, Ohio
- Concrete, pavers installation and drainage work for the Euclid Avenue Corridor project in Cleveland, Ohio
- Heritage Park Improvements at Progressive Field (Home of the Cleveland Guardians Baseball Team)
- Centrifuge Operator for the largest Micro-Tunnel project in the United States that provides a fresh water supply from Lake Erie for the City of Painesville, Ohio - depth of 75' and one mile into Lake Erie inside a 5' diameter pipe

Joe continues providing assistance to Local 860 on weekends and as time permits, mostly addressing safety matters.





CITY OF KIRTLAND, OHIO

2020-PRESENT - THE CITY'S FIRST FULL-TIME PUBLIC WORKS DIRECTOR

The newly elected Mayor of neighboring City of Kirtland, Ohio approached Joe about joining the city in a newly created full-time Public Works Director position. Joe accepted the position, committed to building a family atmosphere at the city, providing careers not jobs, and making Kirtland a better place. This was the first time in Kirtland's history that the Mayor would not be City's Public

Kirtland a better place. This was the tirst time in Kirtland's history that the Mayor would not be City's Public Works Director. Council voted unanimously to confirm Joe Fornaro as the City's Public Works Director.

JOB-RELATED TECHNICAL AND MANAGERIAL ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Joe established a record of community "firsts"

1ST TIME TREE CITY USA





The City of Mayfield Heights was approved as a Tree City USA for the first time in 2016 in large part due to Joe becoming a certified arborist through the International Society of Arborists (ISA). Joe also led the City of Kirtland to achieve Tree City USA status and become a tree city in 2020 for the first time.

1ST TIME 'KEEP AMERICA BEAUTIFUL' AND 'KEEP OHIO BEAUTIFUL' AFFILIATE

Joe's training and willingness to engage volunteers made this achievement possible. Under Joe's leadership the City of Mayfield Heights was recognized as an affiliate of Keep America Beautiful and Keep Ohio Beautiful. The goals of this organization are to reduce, recycle and beautify communities. Joe led the training required and found and encouraged volunteers into the program that made this achievement possible. Beautification projects included pole painting, veterans memorial mulching, and litter pick up.





1ST ADA (AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT) PLAYGROUND FOR CITY OF KIRTLAND

Joe led the first ADA playground for Kirtland. While on the City's wish list for a long time, funding had not been available for this project. Joe researched grant funding and other possible sources as well as developing a close relationship with the Kirtland Kiwanis Club. Joe found grant funding for \$15,000 and the local Kiwanis Club donated another \$10,000, along with private sector donation of \$5,000 so the project was able to proceed.





1ST TIME DIRECTOR CERTIFICATIONS

Joe Fornaro is the first Director in City of Mayfield Heights history to be certified in Public Management, Arboriculture, Safety, Traffic Signal Management, Pavement Markings, Signs, Storm Water, and the Ohio Department of Transportation Local Public Agency (LPA) requirements.

1ST SNOW & ICE CONTROL PLAN

Under Joe's leadership as Director of Public Works he led the development of the City of Mayfield Heights' first Snow & Ice Control Plan which was approved and adopted by City Council.

1ST AQUATIC CENTER IN MAYFIELD HEIGHTS, OHIO

"Right from the start, I have been impressed with Joe's commitment to the City. This was not just a job for Joe, but a way to make a difference in the lives of the residents of Mayfield Heights. Joe always went above and beyond what was required. I saw this countless times over the years, especially when we started the process of developing a Park Master Plan for the Recreation Department. He truly understood the impact this process would have on the city for years to come."

- Sean Ward, City of Mayfield Heights, Director of Recreation Joe had a significant part in the planning, design, and selected site location for the City of Mayfield Heights. The original city pool had been built in the late 1950's and hadn't received any upgrades. In 2017 Joe began the process of working with the City's Recreation Director to help redesign the city parks and community center. They secured a CDBG grant from Cuyahoga County to completely redesign Oakville Park, adding drainage, baseball fields, bocce courts, new pavilion, stone walls with reclaimed curbs from the road program, ADA accessibility, and a site large enough for a future Aquatic Center.

After a hard year and a half process involving numerous meetings with city council, the public, the contractor, COVID, and increasing construction costs, the new aquatic center was built in 2023.





1ST OSHA TRAINING CITYWIDE

Joe led the implementation of OSHA training for all employees citywide. While the City of Mayfield Heights is not governed by OSHA, the City recognized the positive impacts of the best practices through OSHA. Joe was responsible for bringing an OSHA trainer to perform safety audits for all departments and contractors working for the City of Mayfield Heights. Joe was certified with the Board of Safety Professionals and the American Society of Safety Engineers and was the driving force behind creating a safe working environment. This training resulted in a significant decrease in workers compensation claims within one year of implementation.

1ST SAFETY TOWN FOR CHESTER TOWNSHIP, OHIO



As part of his involvement in the local Lions Club, Joe was tasked to help the local police department build the first safety town for kids entering 1st grade to learn and get acquainted with the Township.

Having accomplished tradesmen in the group, Joe and his team constructed the building to look mimic the Township Building and include concrete walks, landscaping, brick archway, and a functioning traffic light.

VARIOUS SUCCESSFUL COST SAVING PROGRAMS

- The City of Mayfield Height's initial recycling program was ended in 2010. Joe's innovative thinking enabled a revival of the recycling program by employing every other week collection which cut costs from the previous weekly program.
- Joe provided oversight and inspection on \$1.2 million LED and energy efficiency improvement program in Mayfield Height's City Hall, funded through a grant from NOPEC (an energy supplier in Ohio). Improvements are estimated to have a payback period of 14.4 years.
- Joe managed a \$250,000 Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR) grant to rebuild Oakville Park for the City of Mayfield Heights.
- Joe assisted in applying for and receiving \$1.2 million dollar funding from the Northeast Ohio Areawide Coordinating Agency (NOACA) to install a roundabout at Lander Road and Parkland for the City of Mayfield Heights. This was an offset intersection at the community's industrial park and traffic would back up for a half hour or more during rush hours and school times. The previous intersection was rated as a level of service category "F" (failed). The improvement improved the intersection traffic flow to a level of service category "B" (stable).
- Joe was instrumental in finding a \$3,500 grant from the local Walmart to start the City's Hometown Hero project. This involve adding banners to pole in the city to recognize "hometown heroes". To date, 50 banners are in place.
- City of Kirtland received \$1.25 million dollars in funding to provide 132 residents to abandon their failing septic wastewater systems and connect to the city sewer system. Joe secured funding under the Water Pollution Control Loan Fund (WPCLF) at a low interest rate and \$1 million dollars from the Lake County Commissioners for this necessary improvement.

INITIAL AND LIFELONG EDUCATION



After high school Joe was accepted to Mount Union College (not yet the University of Mount Union in Alliance, Ohio) and was offered a scholarship to play football. Unfortunately, his career at Mount Union was cut short due to family issues and caring for his family became Joe's priority. Joe began work with Local 860 (Heavy Highway Operators) once he took on the Night Shift Foreman (and Assistant Public Works Director) responsibilities leaving him free to also handle his second job with Local 860. His typical day began at 7:00

AM and sometimes lasted until 3:00 AM, especially during the winter months - living in the "Snow Belt" area along Lake Erie in Cleveland's eastern suburbs the snow response is long and difficult.

Always thinking about how to improve his abilities and to support others, Joe continued to complete "on the job" training and honed his knowledge in areas to enhance his Public Works and Local 860 duties. Safety training and involvement with APWA and with the professional associations noted subsequently in this nomination packet helped Joe improve his knowledge dealing with the several roles he has held.

While not the normal career path, out of necessity Joe has found a way to enhance his continuing improvement and knowledge while fulfilling his family responsibilities and his service to his community.

AMERICAN PUBLIC WORKS ASSOCIATION

As Public Works Director, Joe is regularly involved in presenting information about his Department for the American Public Works Association. Joe has served for many years with the Snow & Ice Committee and has been involved in class presentations relating to various topics of interest to participants regarding snow & ice control.

Joe was a presenter in Chicago (August 2022) at the Winter Maintenance Round Table and with the Winter maintenance Certificate Programs in Omaha, Nebraska and Grand Fork, Nebraska.

Joe was also a presenter on a recent Click Listen & Learn program that addressed COVID and "The New Normal".

NORTHEAST OHIO SERVICE DIRECTORS ASSOCIATION

As a member and President of the Northeast Ohio Service Directors Association, Joe has been called upon to provide periodic presentations regarding local topics. He also conducts an annual presentation as a leader in winter training for staff members of local communities in Northeast Ohio.

ARBOR DAY EDUCATION

Every year on Arbor Day Joe speaks to elementary age children at the local library to explain the importance of trees in our communities. The interest and questions from these children is wide and varied, and Joe always enjoys the opportunity to share his passion with the children in his community.

KIWANIS GROUP

Two times a year Joe speaks on local topics of current important to the community Kiwanis group.

LOCAL 860 CONTRACTORS

Joe continues to address safety related topics locally as a leader for his staff and community and Local 860 contractors in Northeast Ohio.

ANNUAL STAFF HOLIDAY PARTY

Joe and his family host an annual Holiday party for all city staff, departments, engineering, community center, neighboring city staff, council members, and the Mayor. The Fornaro family prepares all the cooking and desserts without using any tax dollars - in the spirit of creating a family atmosphere where they work, and not just jobs.





COACHING YOUTH SPORTS

During the time in Joe's life while working two jobs and his children were growing, he still found time in the evenings to take a role that also kept his love of sports active. Joe coached his boys in wrestling and football and giving back to the community. It is important that wrestlers stay within their weight class so nutrition was always a focus the Fornaro household. It was a standing joke that even the dog had to diet during this time. A favorite quote of Joe's is by Dan Gable, an American professional wrestler and coach who said "once you wrestle everything else in life is easier". Joe and his family live by that sentiment at home. In addition to wrestling, Joe was supportive of his daughter's interest in cheerleading. While he was out painting the lines on the grass field, Joe was also showing her how to do cartwheels and somersaults in a straight line. Hard work paid off. Joe's oldest son went on to play football at the University of Mount Union and his team won a National Championship. His younger son played football at Baldwin Wallace College. And his daughter cheered at Youngstown State. Through all this, Joe's wife has recovered and they are celebrating 30 years of marriage.

PUBLIC WORKS OPEN HOUSE

Community engagement and participation have been important aspects of Joe's leadership. He started a Public Works Open House in Mayfield Heights to align with National Public Works Week. The community is invited to meet with Public Works Staff members, tour facilities, slide down a 12' inflatable dump truck for kids, and display police, fire, public works trucks and equipment for viewing - Touch-A-Truck. In addition, they have a truck rodeo where Public Works drivers compete with City council members and the Mayor. Joe's wife provides homemade "dirt sundaes" complete with small shovels as spoons. This event has grown into one of the most attended events in the city and is fully sponsored by the Fornaro family - no tax dollars spent. Joe has continued this event since becoming Public Works Director in Kirtland.
